The Royal Court (Despatch of Business) Order, 1982

THE ROYAL COURT, in exercise of the powers conferred upon it by Article sixty-four of the Reform (Guernsey) Law, 1948(a), section twelve of the Royal Court of Guernsey (Miscellaneous Reform Provisions) Law, 1950(b), and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf, hereby orders:—

Sittings of
Royal Court.

1. The Full Court or the Ordinary Court may sit on a day and at a time to hear and determine any cause or matter or to conduct any proceedings within its jurisdiction notwithstanding that on that day and at that time the other of such Courts is sitting to hear and determine any cause or matter or to conduct any proceedings within its jurisdiction.

Divisions.

2. (1) The Ordinary Court may, for the more convenient despatch of business, sit in two or more Divisions for such purposes and on such occasions as the Bailiff may, from time to time, direct.

(2) Each Division of the Ordinary Court shall consist of the Bailiff, the Deputy Bailiff or a Lieutenant-Bailiff and at least two Jurats, or, for the purpose of the determination of any question of which he is the sole judge, the Bailiff, the Deputy Bailiff, or the Lieutenant-Bailiff sitting alone.

(3) Each Division of the Ordinary Court shall have co-extensive jurisdiction and powers with the Ordinary Court and any cause or matter or other proceedings which may be heard and determined by or conducted in the Ordinary Court may be heard and determined by or conducted in any such Division.

(4) All causes and matters and other proceedings which may be commenced in the Ordinary Court may be distributed among the several Divisions of the Ordinary Court in such manner as the Bailiff may, from time to time, direct.

3. In this Order the following expressions have the meanings hereby respectively assigned to them, that is to say:—

“the Full Court” means the Royal Court sitting as a Full Court;

“the Ordinary Court” means the Royal Court sitting as an Ordinary Court.

4. This Order may be cited as the Royal Court (Despatch of Business) Order, 1982.
