

GUERNSEY STATUTORY INSTRUMENT 1993 NO //

THE IMPORT AND EXPORT OF GOODS (CONTROL)  
(GUERNSEY) (AMENDMENT) ORDER 1993

THE BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION, in pursuance of its powers under Article 1 of the Import and Export (Control) (Guernsey) Law 1946 hereby orders:-

1. Schedule 1 to The Import and Export of Goods (Control) (Guernsey) Order, 1990 (a), shall be deleted and Schedule 1 hereto substituted in its place.
2. Schedule 2 to The Import and Export of Goods (Control) (Guernsey) Order, 1990 (a), shall be deleted and Schedule 2 hereto substituted in its place.
3. The Import and Export of Goods (Control) (Guernsey) (Amendment) Order, 1991 (b) and The Import and Export of Goods (Control) (Guernsey) (Amendment No 2) Order, 1991 (c), are repealed.
4. This Order may be cited as The Import and Export of Goods (Control) (Guernsey) (Amendment) Order, 1993, and shall come into force on the 9th June 1993.

SCHEDULE 1

Section Four

1. Bovine Somatotrophin (BST)
2. Excrement of an ass, boar, bull, bullock, calf, colt, cow, donkey, ewe, foal, filly, gelding, goat, heifer, hog, horse, kid, lamb, mare, mule, ox, pig, pony, ram, sheep, sow, stallion, steer or wether or of a domestic fowl, duck, goose, guinea fowl or turkey.
3. Firearms and Ammunition, the following:

- (i) firearms, lethal, including any lethal barrelled weapon of any description from which any shot, bullet or other missile can be discharged and other weapons of whatever description designed or adapted for the discharge of any noxious liquid, gas or other thing;
- (ii) component parts (other than wooden gun stocks) of any such firearms or other weapon as aforesaid and any accessory to any such firearm or other weapon designed or adapted to diminish the noise or flash caused by firing the weapon;
- (iii) ammunition, including grenades, bombs, and other like missiles, and any ammunition containing or designed or adapted to contain any noxious liquid, gas or other thing;

other than the following:

- (a) cartridges for smooth-bore guns, being cartridges containing five or more shots ~~none~~ of which exceeds 0.36 in (9mm) in diameter;
- (b) a blank cartridges not exceeding 1 in (25mm) in diameter for use in smooth-bore weapons;
- (c) b articles more than one hundred years old;
- (d) c air guns, air rifles or air pistols incapable of discharging a missile so that the missile has, on being discharged from the muzzle of the weapon, kinetic energy in excess, in the case of an air pistol of 6 ft lb (8.14 joules) or, in the case of an air weapon other than an air pistol, of 12 ft lb (16.27 joules), and air weapons designed for use only under water;
- (e) d ammunition for air guns, air rifles or air pistols.

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4. Indecent or obscene prints, paintings, photographs, books, cards or lithographic or other engravings, or any other indecent or obscene articles.
5. Ivory and its derivatives.

6. Live animals, other than :-

budgerigars,  
canaries,  
cats,  
dogs (not being the type of dog commonly known as the Pit Bull Terrier, the type of dog commonly known as the Japanese Tosa (or Tosa) or any other type of dog which appears to have been bred for fighting),  
donkeys,  
fish,  
finches - British bred, other than any listed as endangered species,  
goats,  
guinea pigs,  
hamsters,  
horses,  
pigs,  
poultry (meaning in this paragraph domestic fowls, ducks, geese, guinea fowls and turkeys),  
rabbits,  
pigeons,  
sheep.

7. Lobsters, live, of the species *Homarus Americanus*.

8. Marine anti-fouling paint.

9. Offensive Weapons, the following:

- (a) a knuckleduster, that is, a band of metal or other hard material worn on one or more fingers, and designed to cause injury, and any weapon incorporating a knuckleduster;
- (b) a swordstick, that is, a hollow walking-stick or cane containing a blade which may be used as a sword;
- (c) the weapon sometimes known as a "handclaw", being a band of metal or other hard material from which a number of sharp spikes protrude, and worn around the hand;
- (d) the weapon sometimes known as a "belt buckle knife", being a buckle which incorporates or conceals a knife;
- (e) the weapon sometimes known as a "push dagger", being a knife the handle of which fits within a clenched fist and the blade of which protrudes from between two fingers;
- (f) the weapon sometimes known as a "hollow kubotan", being a cylindrical container containing a number of sharp spikes;
- (g) the weapon sometimes known as a "footclaw", being a bar of metal or other hard material from which a number of sharp spikes protrude, and worn strapped to the foot;

- (h) the weapon sometimes known as a "shuriken", "shaken" or "death star", being a hard non-flexible plate having three or more sharp radiating points and designed to be thrown;
- (i) the weapon sometimes known as a "balisong" or "butterfly knife", being a blade enclosed by its handle, which is designed to split down the middle, without the operation of a spring or other mechanical means, to reveal the blade;
- (j) the weapon sometimes known as a "telescopic truncheon", being a truncheon which extends automatically by hand pressure applied to a button, spring or other device in or attached to its handle;
- (k) the weapon sometimes known as a "blowpipe" or "blow gun", being a hollow tube out of which hard pellets or darts are shot by the use of breath;
- (l) the weapon sometimes known as a "kusari gama", being a length of rope, cord, wire or chain fastened at one end to a sickle;
- (m) the weapon sometimes known as a "kyoketsu shoge", being a length of rope, cord, wire or chain fastened at one end to a hooked knife;
- (n) the weapon sometimes known as a "manrikigusari" or "kusari", being a length of rope, cord, wire or chain fastened at each end to a hard weight or hand grip;
- (o) the weapon sometimes known as a "flick knife" or "flick gun" being any knife which has a blade which opens automatically by hand pressure applied to a button, spring or other device in or attached to the handle of the knife, or any knife which has a blade which is released from the handle or a sheath thereof by the force of gravity or the application of centrifugal force and which, when released, is locked in place by means of a button, spring, lever or other device, sometimes known as a "gravity knife";

Other than articles more than one hundred years old.

10. Apparatus for wireless telegraphy consisting of a base station and one or more mobile stations where -

- (i) each of such stations is designed or adapted to be used -
  - (a) to send verbal messages to be conveyed over a public telecommunication system; and
  - (b) to receive messages conveyed over a public telecommunication system; and
- (ii) each of such stations is capable of simultaneously sending such verbal messages to any and every other such station; and

(iii) the base station only is capable of connection to a public telecommunication system,

which apparatus -

- (1) is not cordless telephone apparatus which is designed or adapted to operate on not more than two of the channels specified in paragraph 1.2 of Performance Specification MPT 1322 first published in August 1982, as amended, and which complies with the terms, provisions and limitations specified in regulation 3 of, and the Schedule to, the Wireless Telegraphy (Exemption) Regulations 1982, as amended, and
- (2) is not designed or adapted for use on frequencies exceeding 853 MHz.

11. Wireless telegraphy apparatus known as "Citizens Band" which is designed or adapted, or has facilities permitting its adaptation, for the purpose of transmitting spoken messages on the frequency band 26.1 MHz to 28 MHz, unless -

- (a) the CB apparatus operates only on one or more of the frequencies specified in paragraph 1.3 of Performance Specification MPT 1320 as amended, published in April 1981, or paragraph 1.3 of Part A of Performance Specification MPT 1333 published in December 1986; and
- (b) the CB apparatus complies with the requirements specified in Schedule 1 to the Wireless Telegraphy (Citizens' Band and Amateur Apparatus) (Various Provisions) Order 1988; and
- (c) in the case of CB apparatus which operates on any of the frequencies specified in paragraph 1.3 of Part A of the said MPT 1333, the apparatus is approved for the time being by the Secretary of State under section 84 of the Telecommunications Act 1984 for the purpose of the said Order of 1988.

12. Wireless telegraphy apparatus designed or adapted for the purpose of transmitting messages in the frequency band 28 MHz to 29.7 MHz and in no other frequency band.

13. Any cosmetic product containing a substance set out in Schedule 1 to the Cosmetic Products (Safety) Regulations, 1989 (U.K. S.I. 1989/2233) as amended from time to time or in any re-enactment thereof.

14. Any decoding equipment which is designed or adapted to be used primarily for the purpose of enabling the reception of programmes transmitted in the provision of a proscribed service within the meaning of Section 178 of the Broadcasting Act 1990.

SCHEDULE 2

Section Five

1. Any cosmetic product containing a substance set out in Schedule 1 to the Cosmetic Products (Safety) Regulations, 1989 (U.K. S.I. 1989/2233) as amended from time to time or in any re-enactment thereof.
2. Any decoding equipment which is designed or adapted to be used primarily for the purpose of enabling the reception of programmes transmitted in the provision of a proscribed service within the meaning of Section 178 of the Broadcasting Act 1990.

### Explanatory Note

(This note is not part of the Amendment Order but is intended to indicate its general purport).

The effect of the Amendment Order is to:-

- 1) prohibit without a Licence the importation from and the exportation to the United Kingdom, Jersey, the other Islands of the Bailiwick of Guernsey and the Isle of Man, of any decoding equipment enabling reception of proscribed services (e.g. Red Hot Television),
- 2) permit without a Licence the importation from the United Kingdom, Jersey, the other Islands of the Bailiwick of Guernsey and the Isle of Man, of non-endangered species of British bred finches.

The Order also consolidates previous amendments.
