

**The Control of Intoxicating Liquor (Designated Public Places)  
(Liberation Day) Order 2007**

Made: 4 May 2007

Coming into force: 9 May 2007

THE STATES HOME DEPARTMENT, in exercise of the powers conferred upon it by section 2(1) and (2) of the Control of Intoxicating Liquor (Designated Public Places) Ordinance, 2007, hereby orders:-


1. In order to prevent nuisance or annoyance to members of the public or a section of the public or disorder which is likely to be associated with the consumption of intoxicating liquor in that place, the area marked in red on the attached plan, that is:-
  - (a) The Gategny Esplanade to the south of its junction with Bosq Lane, the North Esplanade, North Plantation, Le Tourgand, to its junction with Le Pollet, and the Quay to its junction with Church Hill; and
  - (b) The North Beach Car Park from its north access road at the St. Julian's Roundabout to the service road running north to south at the eastern end of the area designated as disc zone and St. Julian's Emplacement to the south from its junction with the said access road and the St. Julian's Roundabout; and
  - (c) The Weighbridge taxi rank to the junction with Le Truchot to the west, the junction with Le Pollet to the south and the junction with St. Julian's Avenue to the north; and
  - (d) The Victoria Pier for its entire area, including the north and south arms of the Pier; and
  - (e) The Albert Pier for its entire area; and
  - (f) North Pier Steps from the Quay to the High Street; and
  - (g) Quay Steps from the Quay to North Pier Steps; and

- (h) Quay Street from its junction with the Quay to its junction with High Street; and
- (i) Cow Lane from its junction with the Quay to its junction with Church Square; and
- (j) The paved area to the seaward side of the Town Church to its junction with Church Hill to the south and its boundary with Church Square to its west; and
- (k) The two Venelles located between Quay Steps and Quay Street from their junction with Quay to the High Street

shall be a designated public place for the purpose of the Ordinance within the times specified below.

2. The area specified in 1. above, save for (e) shall be a designated public place between 11:00am and 11:00pm .on Wednesday 9 May 2007.
3. The area specified in 1. (e) shall be a designated public place between 11:00am and 6:00pm .on Wednesday 9 May 2007.
4. This Order may be cited as the Intoxicating Liquor (Designated Public Places) (Liberation Day)Order 2007
5. This Order shall come into force on the 9 May 2007.

## EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Order but is intended to indicate its general purport).

This order sets out the areas that are to be designated as a Designated Public Place, that is, prohibiting the consumption of intoxicating liquor in the areas so specified during the times specified.

The Order shall not apply to:-

- (a) licensed premises within the meaning of the Liquor Licensing Ordinance 2006 ;
- (b) a place within the curtilage of such licensed premises;
- (c) a place which may be used for the supply of intoxicating liquor or which could have been so used within the last twenty minutes by virtue of an occasional liquor permit within the meaning of the Liquor Licensing Ordinance 2006; or
- (d) a place where facilities or activities relating to the sale of or consumption of intoxicating liquor are for the time being permitted by virtue of an *al fresco* licence granted under the Public Highways (Temporary Closure) Ordinance 1999.

Further, if a police officer reasonably believes that a person is, or has been, consuming intoxicating liquor in a designated public place or intends to consume intoxicating liquor in such a place the officer may require the person concerned:-

- (a) not to consume in that place anything which is, or which the police officer reasonably believes to be, intoxicating liquor;
- (b) to surrender anything in his possession which is, or which the police officer reasonably believes to be, intoxicating liquor or a container for such liquor.

However, a person is not required to surrender intoxicating liquor in a sealed container unless a police officer reasonably believes that the person concerned intends to consume the liquor in a designated public place.
