**The Social Insurance (Married Women and Widows) (Amendment)
Regulations, 1999**

THE GUERNSEY SOCIAL SECURITY AUTHORITY, in exercise of the powers conferred upon it by section 97 of the Social Insurance (Guernsey) Law, 1978, as amended^a, hereby orders:-

Amendment

1. In Regulation 13 of the Social Insurance (Married Women and Widows) (Guernsey) Regulations, 1978, as amended^b, ("the principal regulations"), for paragraph (1) there is substituted the following:

"(1) Subject to the provisions of this regulation, where, otherwise than by reason of re-marriage or cohabitation with a man as his wife, a woman ceases to be entitled to a widow's benefit, she shall be deemed to have satisfied, as respects the one hundred and fifty-six reckonable contributions required to have been paid, the contribution conditions for an old age pension."

Repeal

2. Regulation 12 of the principal regulations is repealed.

Citation

3. This Regulation may be cited as the Social Insurance (Married Women and Widows) (Amendment) Regulations, 1999.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Regulations, but is intended to indicate their general purport.)
These Regulations form part of a process to streamline the administration of benefit payments, deleting obsolete provisions that are now unnecessary, and which were both complex and rarely, if ever, used.
