Import and Export (Control) (Alderney) Law, 1946

**Import and Export of Goods (Control)
(Alderney) Order, 2001**

The States of Alderney Policy & Finance Committee (“the Committee”) in pursuance of the powers conferred upon it by Article 1 of The Import and Export (Control) (Alderney) Law, 1946(a) **HEREBY ORDERS** :-

1. Subject to the provisions of this Order, no goods shall be imported into or exported from the Island or shipped as ships’ stores.
2. Section 1 does not prohibit the importation or exportation of any goods, or the shipment of any goods as ships’ stores for use on board the ship, under the authority of and in accordance with the conditions of a licence granted by the Committee or by a person or body of persons authorised by the said Committee to grant such licences.
3. A licence granted under Section 2 may be modified or revoked at any time by any person or body empowered to grant such licences.
4. Section 1 does not prohibit the importation of any goods which are proved to the satisfaction of the Committee to have been consigned from the United Kingdom, the Island of Jersey, any other Island of the Bailiwick of Guernsey or the Isle of Man, other than goods described in Schedule 1.
5. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Order, no person shall import any cattle except from any of the other Islands of the Bailiwick of Guernsey and unless the cattle have been certified by the Guernsey States Veterinary Officer as being free from Tuberculosis, Brucellosis and Epizootic Bovine Leucosis.
6. Section 4 does not prohibit the importation of any firearms or ammunition of a description set out in Schedule 1 to this Order provided that they are:-

- (a) Imported by a local resident, and at the time of importation there is produced to a Customs Officer of the States of Guernsey the appropriate certificate or permit requirements of the Dangerous Weapons (Alderney) Law 1965, and the Dangerous Weapons (Alderney) Ordinance, 1965, or
 - (b) Imported on board a ship or aircraft, and fully declared to a Customs Officer of the States of Guernsey as part of the equipment of the ship or aircraft.
7. Section 1 does not prohibit the exportation of any goods, other than goods described in Schedule 2 to the United Kingdom, the Island of Jersey, any other Island of the Bailiwick of Guernsey or the Isle of Man.
 8. Section 1 does not prohibit the exportation from the Island to a place other than a place in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, the Island of Jersey, or any of the other Islands of the Bailiwick of Guernsey, of personal or household effects, whether accompanied or unaccompanied, which are the personal or household effects of the exporter save that a Customs Officer of the States of Guernsey may, before export, require the exporter of such effects to satisfy that officer that the effects to be exported are the personal or household effects of that exporter, and that the effects do not include articles or goods which are comprised or listed in Schedule 1 or Schedule 1A to the Export of Goods (Control) Order, 1989 (UK SI 1989 No 2376) as amended from time to time or in any re-enactment thereof.
 9. No goods shall be unshipped, landed or put on shore except at Braye Harbour or at Alderney Airport and no goods shall be shipped, put off or waterborne to be shipped for exportation, except from such Harbour or such Airport.
 10. The Interpretation (Guernsey) Law, 1948 shall apply to the Interpretation of this Order as it applies to the Interpretation of a Guernsey enactment.
 11. No provision of this Order or of any licence hereunder shall authorise the doing of any thing prohibited, regulated or controlled by any other enactment or statutory instrument.
 12. The Import and Export of Goods (Control) (Alderney) Order, 1995(b) is hereby repealed.

13. This Order may be cited as the Import and Export of Goods (Control) (Alderney) Order, 2001 and shall come into force on the thirteenth day of December Two Thousand and One.

SCHEDULE 1**Section Four****PART I**

1. Bovine somatotrophin (BST)
2. Excrement of an ass, boar, bull, bullock, calf, colt, cow, donkey, ewe, foal, filly, gelding, goat, heifer, hog, horse, kid, lamb, mare, mule, ox, pig, pony, ram, sheep, sow, stallion, steer or wether, or of a domestic fowl, duck, goose, guinea fowl or turkey.
3. Firearms and Ammunition, the following:—
 - (i) firearms, lethal, including any lethal barrelled weapon of any description from which any shot, bullet or other missile can be discharged and other weapons of whatever description designed or adapted for the discharge of any noxious liquid, gas or other thing;
 - (ii) component parts (other than wooden gun stocks) of any such firearms or other weapon as aforesaid and any accessory to any such firearm or other weapon designed or adapted to diminish the noise or flash caused by firing the weapon;
 - (iii) ammunition, including grenades, bombs, and other like missiles, and any ammunition containing or designed or adapted to contain any noxious liquid, gas or other thing;

other than the following:—

 - (a) blank cartridges not exceeding 1 inch (25mm) in diameter for use in smooth-bore weapons;
 - (b) articles more than one hundred years old;
 - (c) air guns, air rifles or air pistols incapable of discharging a missile so that the missile has, on being discharged from the muzzle of the weapon, kinetic energy in excess, in the case of an air pistol of 6 ft lb (8.14 joules) or, in the case of an air weapon other than an air pistol, of 12 ft lb (16.27 joules) and air weapons designed for use only under water;
 - (d) ammunition for air guns, air rifles or air pistols.
4. Indecent or obscene prints, paintings, photographs, books, cards or lithographic or other engravings, or any other indecent or obscene articles.
5. Live animals including birds and poultry) other than cats, dogs (not being the type of dog commonly known as the Pit Bull Terrier, the type of dog known as the Japanese Tosa (or Tosa) or any other type of dog which appears to have been bred for fighting), fish, guinea pigs, hamsters, rabbits, crickets, meal worms and stick insects.
6. Lobsters, live, of the species *Homarus americanus*.
7. Marine anti-fouling paint.

8. Offensive weapons, the following:--

- (a) a knuckleduster, that is, a band of metal or other hard material worn on one or more fingers and designed to cause injury, and any weapon incorporating a knuckleduster;
- (b) a swordstick, that is, a hollow walking-stick or cane containing a blade which may be used as a sword;
- (c) the weapon sometimes known as a "handclaw", being a band of metal or other hard material from which a number of sharp spikes protrude and worn around the hand;
- (d) the weapon sometimes known as a "belt buckle knife", being a buckle which incorporates or conceals a knife;
- (e) the weapon sometimes known as a "push-dagger", being a knife the handle of which fits within a clenched fist and the blade of which protrudes from between two fingers;
- (f) the weapon sometimes known as a "hollow kubotan", being a cylindrical container containing a number of sharp spikes;
- (g) the weapon sometimes known as a "footclaw", being a bar of metal or other hard material from which a number of sharp spikes protrude, and worn strapped to the foot;
- (h) the weapon sometimes known as a "shuriken", "shaken" or "death star" being a hard non-flexible plate having three or more sharp radiating points and designed to be thrown;
- (i) the weapon sometimes known as a "balisong" or "butterfly knife" being a blade enclosed by its handle, which is designed to split down the middle, without the operation of a spring or other mechanical means, to reveal the blade;
- (j) the weapon sometimes known as a "telescopic truncheon" being a truncheon which extends automatically by hand pressure applied to a button, spring or other device in or attached to its handle;
- (k) the weapon sometimes known as a "blowpipe" or "blow gun" being a hollow tube out of which hard pellets or darts are shot by the use of breath;
- (l) the weapon sometimes known as a "kusari gama" being a length of rope, cord, wire or chain fastened at one end to a sickle;
- (m) the weapon sometimes known as a "kyokatsu shoge" being a length of rope, cord, wire or chain fastened at one end to a Hooked knife;
- (n) the weapon sometimes known as a "manrikigusari" or "kusari" being a length of rope, cord, wire or chain fastened at each end to a hard weight or hand grip;
- (o) the weapon sometimes known as a "flick knife" or "flick gun" being any knife which has a blade which opens automatically by hand pressure applied to a button, spring or other device in or attached to the handle of the knife, or any knife which has a blade which is released from the handle or a sheath thereof by the force of gravity or the application of centrifugal force and which, when released, is locked in place by means of a button, spring, lever or other device, sometimes known as a "gravity knife";

other than articles more than one hundred years old.

9. Any cosmetic product containing a substance set out in Schedule 1 to the Cosmetic Products (Safety) Regulations, 1989 (UK SI 1989/2233) as amended from time to time or in any re-enactment thereof.
10. The tail of any lobster or the claw of any lobster, edible crab or spinous spider crab, the tail or claw of which, as the case may be, is separated from such lobster, edible crab or spinous spider crab.
11. Any decoding equipment which is designed or adapted to be used primarily for the purpose of enabling the reception of programmes transmitted in the provision of a proscribed service within the meaning of Section 178 of the Broadcasting Act 1990.
12. A fishing parlour pot, being a parlour pot within the meaning set down in the States of Alderney Fishing (Parlour Pots) Ordinance, 1992.*
13. Any prescription medicines, for human use, listed in the Medicines (Products other than Veterinary Drugs) (Prescription Only) Order 1983, (UK SI 1983/1212) as amended from time to time, or in any re-enactment thereof.
14. Any prescription medicines, for animal use, listed in the Medicines (Veterinary Drugs) (Prescription Only) Order 1991 (UK SI 1991/1392) as amended from time to time, or in any re-enactment thereof.
15. Any counterfeit of a currency note or of a protected coin.
16. Chemicals – any of the following substances:–
 - acetic anhydride
 - acetylanthranilic acid (otherwise known as 2-acetamidobenzoic acid)
 - anthranilic acid
 - aphedrine
 - ergometrine
 - ergotamine
 - isosafrole (cis + trans)
 - lysergic acid
 - phenylacetic acid
 - piperidine
 - piperonal
 - pseudoephedrine
 - safrole
 - 1-phenyl-2-propanone (otherwise known as phenylacetone)
 - 3,4 methylenedioxyphenylpropan-2-one

the salts of any of the foregoing substances whenever the existence of such salts is possible.

SCHEDULE 1

PART II

1. Animal Feedstuffs
2. Fertiliser.
3. Animal bedding material other than from the Bailiwick of Guernsey, Bailiwick of Jersey, Isle of Man, Republic of Ireland and other Member States of the European Union except the United Kingdom.
4. Fresh and frozen meat and meat products, other than poultry, game birds and exotic meats.
5. Milk and dairy products other than milk and dairy products which have been subject to pasteurisation.
6. For the purposes of Schedule I the following meanings shall apply :

“animal bedding material” means any hay, straw, hay and straw chaffed together and litter used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals;

“animal feedstuffs” means anything that is intended to be fed to animals;

“bovine offal” means the brain, intestines, spinal cord, spleen, tonsils or thymus of bovine animals;

“exotic meat” means the meat of alligator, kangaroo and ostrich;

“fertiliser” means any natural manufactured or processed material or compound that is intended to be spread and or worked into the soil to increase its capacity to support plant growth;

“game birds” means grouse, partridge, pheasant, snipe, wild duck and woodcock and includes birds that have been farmed or taken from the wild;

“meat and meat products, fresh and frozen” means any part of the following animals: cattle, deer, goats and pigs; includes smoked, cured and dried products and generally means any meat that requires cooking before it can be consumed;

“pasteurisation” means milk which has been pasteurised at a temperature of at least 71.7°C for 15 seconds or to milk products made from pasteurised milk;

“poultry” means chickens, ducks, geese, guinea-fowl or turkeys.
