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**The Clean Milk (Classification and Fixing  
of Prices) Ordinance, 1951.**

THE STATES, in pursuance of their Resolution of the 28th day of March, 1951, hereby order:—

1. All milk received at the States Dairy shall be classified for the purposes of this Ordinance by some person authorised in that behalf by the Committee.

2. For the purpose of classifying milk the Committee shall cause to be applied thereto such tests as the Committee shall from time to time direct, so however that all milk shall fall into one of the following grades:—

1. (satisfactory for retail milk trade);

2. (unsatisfactory for retail milk trade but satisfactory for manufacturing purposes);
  3. (unfit for retail milk trade or for manufacturing purposes).
3. The classification of milk under the provisions of this Ordinance shall take place not later than three hours after the time when such milk is received at the States Dairy.
4. (1) Subject to the provisions of the next succeeding subsections, the price to be paid by the Committee in respect of milk shall be that from time to time laid down by Resolution of the States in respect of Grade 1 milk.
- (2) The price payable by the Committee in respect of milk which is classified as Grade 2 shall be at such reasonable rate per pot as the Committee shall from time to time determine.
- (3) The Committee shall not pay any price in respect of milk which has either—
- (a) been certified by the Medical Officer of Health as being unfit for human consumption; or
  - (b) been classified as Grade 3 milk.
- (4) In the event of milk which has been received at the States Dairy not having been, before three hours have elapsed from the time of such receipt, either
- (a) certified as aforesaid as unfit for human consumption; or
  - (b) classified under this Ordinance as of a Grade other than Grade 1;
- that milk shall be paid for as if it were milk classified as of Grade 1.
5. The Committee shall, in the case of milk received at the States Dairy which is either—

- (a) certified as aforesaid as unfit for human consumption ; or
- (b) classified as of Grade 2 or Grade 3 under this Ordinance ;

notify the supplier thereof of such certification or classification as soon as it is reasonably practicable to do so after such certification or classification has taken place and shall, in every case, send to the supplier by post at his usual address, within twenty-four hours of such certification or classification, as the case may be, all the information likely reasonably to be required by him regarding such certification or classification.

6. In this Ordinance the following expressions have, unless the context otherwise requires, the meanings hereby respectively assigned to them—

- “ Committee ” means the States Dairy Committee ;
- “ milk ” means milk produced in this Island.

7. Article two of the Clean Milk Ordinance, 1945 (No. XXXIX of 1945) (hereinafter referred to as the “ principal Ordinance ”) is hereby repealed.

8. This Ordinance and the principal Ordinance may be cited together as “ The Clean Milk Ordinances, 1945 and 1951 ”.

9. This Ordinance shall come into force on the 1st day of May, 1951.

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**The Glasshouse (Prescribed Maximum Area) Ordinance, 1951.**

THE STATES, in pursuance of their Resolution of the 25th day of April, 1951, under and by virtue of the powers vested in them by section three of The Glasshouse Control Law, 1936, hereby order :—

1.—(1) During the period commencing on the 1st day of May, 1951, and ending on the 30th day of April, 1952,—

- (a) a person not being the owner of any glasshouse at any time since the 30th day of April, 1950, may be permitted to erect glasshouses of an area not exceeding 9,000 square feet;
- (b) a person owning at any time since the 30th day of April, 1950, glasshouses of an area of less than 4,500 square feet

may be permitted to erect glasshouses of such an area that the total area of glasshouses owned by that person, including in that area any glasshouse owned by him at any time between the 30th day of April, 1951, and the date of his application for a permit, shall not exceed 9,000 square feet ;

(c) a person owning glasshouses of an area of 4,500 square feet or over may be permitted to erect glasshouses of an area not exceeding 4,500 square feet.

(2) In determining the maximum area of glasshouses which may be erected by any person, only glasshouses which are owned by that person in Guernsey shall be taken into account.

2. Nothing in the preceding section shall prevent the renewal by the States Committee for Horticulture of a permit granted to any person under the provisions of sub-section (2) of section six of The Glasshouse Control Law, 1936, before the coming into force of this Ordinance.

3. This Ordinance shall come into force on the 23rd day of May, 1951.
