The Fishing (Amendment) (No. 2) Ordinance, 1972

THE STATES, in pursuance of their Resolution of the twenty-ninth day of March, nineteen hundred and seventy-two, hereby order:—

1. The Fishing Ordinance, 1969, as amended^(a), is hereby further amended as follows:—

- (a) in subsection (1) of section eleven thereof the words “in those parts of the territorial waters of this Island specified in paragraph one, paragraph two and paragraph three of the Third Schedule to this Ordinance” are repealed and the words “in any part of the part of the territorial waters of this Island specified in the Third Schedule to this Ordinance” are substituted therefor;
- (b) the Third Schedule thereto is repealed and the Third Schedule set out in the Schedule to this Ordinance is substituted therefor.

SCHEDULE Section one

“ THIRD SCHEDULE

Section eleven

The part of the territorial waters of this Island in which diving for lobsters, crawfish, crabs, scallops and ormers is prohibited

All that part of the territorial waters of this Island lying within the area bounded by the west, north and east coasts of the Island of Guernsey, the limits of the said territorial waters and two imaginary lines from the coast of the Island of Guernsey to the limits of the said territorial waters, respectively, namely—

- (1) an imaginary line drawn south-west from the most southerly of the British Broadcasting Corporation's television masts, in the parish of Torteval, from the point where such line meets the west coast of the Island of Guernsey to the point where such line meets the limits of the said territorial waters; and
- (2) an imaginary line drawn from the Belvedere Light through the Castle Breakwater Light, in the parish of Saint Peter Port, from the point where such line meets the east coast of the Island of Guernsey to the point where such line meets the limits of the said territorial waters. ”
