The Emergency Powers (Declaration of State of
Emergency) (Bailiwick of Guernsey) Order, 1976

WHEREAS by the Emergency Powers (Bailiwick of Guernsey) Law, 1965(a), it is enacted that if at any time it appears to the States of Guernsey Emergency Council (hereafter in this Order referred to as "the Emergency Council") that there have occurred, or are about to occur, events of such a nature as to be calculated, by interfering with the supply and distribution of food, water, fuel or light, or with the means of transport, to deprive the community within the Bailiwick of Guernsey or any substantial portion of that community, of the essentials of life, the Emergency Council may, by order, declare that a state of emergency exists:

AND WHEREAS the prolonged and continuing hot, dry weather resulting in a grave diminution of the Island water resources does, in the opinion of the Emergency Council, constitute a state of emergency within the meaning of the said Law:

NOW THEREFORE, in the pursuance of the said Law, the Emergency Council hereby declares that a state of emergency exists.
