**The Liquor Licensing (Amendment)
Ordinance, 1958**

THE STATES LEGISLATION COMMITTEE, in pursuance of the Resolution of the States of the thirty-first day of July, nineteen hundred and fifty-seven, and of the powers conferred upon them by paragraph (3) of Article sixty-six of the Reform (Guernsey) Law, 1948, hereby order:—

1. (1) Notwithstanding any of the provisions of the Liquor Licensing Ordinance, 1948, as amended (hereinafter referred to as “the principal Ordinance”), the Royal Court may, on application being made to it in that behalf in accordance with the provisions of section eleven of the principal Ordinance, grant a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor (hereinafter referred to as “a Public Hall Licence”) if it is satisfied that the premises in respect of which the licence is being applied for are licensed by the Royal Court as a “salle publique” under the provisions of

the Law entitled "Loi ayant rapport aux licences pour les Salles Publiques" registered on the fourth day of July, nineteen hundred and fourteen (hereinafter referred to as "the Public Halls Law").

(2) A Public Hall Licence shall cease to be valid upon the premises in respect of which it has been granted ceasing for any reason to be licensed as a "salle publique" under the provisions of the Public Halls Law.

2. A person shall not sell or supply intoxicating liquor or cause or permit any such liquor to be sold, supplied or consumed on any premises in respect of which he holds a Public Hall Licence otherwise than—

- (a) on the days and during the hours on and during which intoxicating liquor may be supplied, in accordance with the provisions of section five and Part I and Part III of the Second Schedule to the principal Ordinance, on premises in respect of which there is in force a Public House Licence; and
- (b) during any period when the premises are being used for a purpose, other than a cinematograph show, within the terms of the licence held in respect of those premises under the provisions of the Public Halls Law and during an additional thirty minutes immediately preceding that period.

3. The annual fee payable in advance to the States in equal half-yearly payments in respect of a Public Hall Licence shall be the sum of thirty pounds.

4. Subject to the preceding provisions of this Ordinance, the provisions of the principal Ordinance

relating to a Public House Licence, other than subsection (1) of section twenty-seven thereof, shall apply to a Public Hall Licence.

5. (1) Notwithstanding any of the provisions of the principal Ordinance, a person who is the holder of a Café Licence shall be required, upon the request of any person, to sell and supply to that person food or non-alcoholic beverages or both for consumption on the premises in respect of which he holds that Café Licence.

(2) Any person who fails to comply with the provisions of the last preceding subsection shall be guilty of an offence and liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding ten pounds.

6. In subsection (1) of section thirty of the principal Ordinance the words "reputed in the trade to contain at least half a pint" are hereby deleted and the words "and in liqueur chocolates" are hereby substituted therefor.

7. This Ordinance and the Liquor Licensing Ordinances, 1948 to 1957, shall, except where otherwise specifically provided herein, be construed as one and may be cited together as the Liquor Licensing Ordinances, 1948 to 1958.
