Ordinance of the States. **XXVII**

1953

Made 6th November, 1953.

Came into Operation ... 6th November, 1953.

The Penicillin and Allied Substances (Amendment) Ordinance, 1953.

THE STATES, on the representations of the States Board of Health and the States Committee for Agriculture and Fisheries, hereby order:—

1. In subsection (1) of section two of the Penicillin and Allied Substances Ordinance, 1950 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Ordinance") the word "unless" is hereby repealed and the following words substituted therefor—

"or such other therapeutic substances as may be prescribed by order made by the States Board of Health (hereinafter referred to as "the Board") being substances appearing to the Board to be capable of causing damage to the health of the community if used without a proper safeguard, unless".

2. Subsection (1) of section two of the principal Ordinance shall not apply to the sale or supply of a substance or preparation specified in an order made

by the Board under this section, if it is sold or supplied in such circumstances and in accordance with such conditions as may be specified in that order.

3. Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of an order made under this Ordinance shall, on conviction, be liable to the same penalties as if he had committed an offence under the provisions of section two of the principal Ordinance.

4. Every order made by the Board under the provisions of section two of this Ordinance or under the provisions of section two of the principal Ordinance shall be laid before a Meeting of the States as soon as may be after the making thereof and if, at that Meeting or at the next subsequent Meeting, the States resolve that the order be annulled, the order shall cease to have effect but without prejudice to anything done thereunder or to the making by the Board of any new order.

5. This Ordinance shall be construed as one with the principal Ordinance, and this Ordinance and the principal Ordinance may be cited together as the Penicillin and Allied Substances Ordinances, 1950 and 1953.
