Ordinance of the States. **XXIX**
1950

Made 20th September, 1950.

Coming into operation ... 1st October, 1950.

**The Wild Plants Protection Ordinance,
1950.**

THE STATES, on the representations of the States
Advisory Council, hereby order:—

1. No person shall, without permission in that behalf obtained from the States Committee for the Preservation of Natural Beauties, sell or purchase or offer to sell or purchase any root, bulb, corm or rhizome of a wild fern or flower otherwise than in the course of and incidentally to the sale or purchase of, or an offer to sell or to purchase, the land on or in which such root, bulb, corm or rhizome is situate.

2. For the purposes of this Ordinance, the expression "wild fern or flower" shall mean any fern or flower other than a fern or flower cultivated on private property, not being a plant scheduled for the time being as a noxious weed under the Loi relative aux Mauvaises Herbes, registered on the Records of this Island on the 16th day of July, 1927, or under any enactment from time to time amending or replacing that Law.

3. A person who infringes any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an offence and liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding twenty-five pounds, and in addition to such fine, the Court may order the confiscation and subsequent disposal of any root, bulb, corm or rhizome to which the offence relates.

4. This Ordinance shall come into force on the 1st day of October, 1950.
