ORDINANCE OF THE STATES

Made 12th November, 1956
Coming into force 13th November, 1956

THE TETHERING OF BULLS ORDINANCE, 1956

THE STATES, in pursuance of their Resolution of 4th September, 1956, hereby order:

1. The owner or person in charge of a bull shall not tether, permit or cause a bull to be tethered in such a way that such bull may reach within twenty feet of any public road, path or place, route de souffrance over which any other persons have a right of way, or within reach of the boundary of any land in the occupation of any other person except by permission of such person.
2. A bull shall be tethered by means of a chain of sufficient strength passing through the bull's nose ring and securely attached to not fewer than two pegs each not less than twenty-four inches long both of which shall be driven home into the ground.
3. A person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding ten pounds sterling.
4. An owner of a bull tethered in contravention of any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance unless he proves that the offence was committed without his knowledge, or that he exercised all due diligence to prevent the commission of the offence.
5. In this Ordinance "bull" means an uncastrated male bovine animal more than twelve months old.
6. This Ordinance shall come into force on the 13th November, 1956.
