**The Road Traffic (Pedestrian Control)
Ordinance, 1957**

THE STATES, on the representations of the Island Police Committee, hereby order:—

1. (1) Where a police officer in uniform is for the time being engaged in the regulation of vehicular or pedestrian traffic in a roadway, any pedestrian who proceeds across or along a carriageway in contravention of a direction to stop given by the police officer, either to pedestrians or to pedestrians and other traffic shall be guilty of an offence and liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding five pounds or, in the case of a second or subsequent offence, to a fine not exceeding ten pounds.

(2) The provisions of the last preceding subsection shall, notwithstanding the provisions of Regulation "R₃" of the Ordinance entitled "Ordonnance

ayant rapport au Trafic Véhiculaire en cette Ile ” of the twenty-first day of January, nineteen hundred and twenty-nine, apply as respects a crossing place for pedestrians when vehicular or pedestrian traffic at that crossing place is being regulated by a police officer in uniform.

(3) A police officer may require any person committing an offence against subsection (1) of this section to give his name and address and if that person fails to do so or gives a name or address which is false in a material particular he shall be guilty of an offence and liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

2. For the purposes of this Ordinance the following expressions have the meanings hereby respectively assigned to them—

“carriageway” does not include that part of any roadway which consists of a street refuge;

“roadway” means any highway and any other place to which the public have access.

3. This Ordinance shall come into force on the first day of June, nineteen hundred and fifty-seven.
