

THE EXPORT OF PRODUCE (OTHER THAN TOMATOES) ORDER, 1964

THE STATES COMMITTEE FOR HORTICULTURE, under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon it by the provisions of paragraph (b) of subsection (1) and subsection (3) of section seven of the Export of Produce (Other than Tomatoes) (Packing and Grading) Ordinance, 1956(a), as amended by the Export of Produce (Other than Tomatoes) (Packing and Grading) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1962(b), and of all other powers enabling it in that behalf, hereby orders:-

1. Flowers exported from this Island shall be so exported in a container
 - (1) which is fitted with one or more pinned sticks so as to enable the flowers to be held in a reasonably secure position; or
 - (2) which is fitted with one or more bridges of such type and material as may from time to time be approved by the Committee, which bridges shall be so placed in the container and secured to the sides thereof so as to enable the flowers to be held in a reasonably secure position.

PROVIDED that flowers of the kinds specified in the left hand column of the First Schedule to this Order may be secured in the container by the methods prescribed in the right hand column of that Schedule in relation to those kinds of flowers respectively.

2. A person may export from this Island flowers of the kinds specified in the left hand column of the Second Schedule to this Order in containers of a type specified in relation thereto in the centre column of the said Schedule with the containers lined or the flowers covered, as the case may be, to such extent and in such manner as is specified in relation to those containers and those flowers respectively in the right hand column of the said Schedule.
3. The Export of Produce (Other than Tomatoes) Order, 1958(c), is hereby repealed.
4. The Interpretation (Guernsey) Law, 1948, shall apply to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an enactment.
5. This Order shall come into operation on the thirteenth day of January, nineteen hundred and sixty-four.

Kind of Flowers	Method of Securing in Container
Anemones Carnations Freesias Geraniums Gerberas Ixias Lilies of the Valley Orchids Ranunculus Scabious Sweet Peas	By the use of paper or card laid across the stems of the flowers in one or more places and so secured to the bottom of the container as to ensure that the flowers are held in a reasonably secure position. Where the method of securing is by means of staples, the ends thereof shall be either closed or splayed.
Carnations	In the case of flowers packed in double walled containers by the use of spills so placed and paper or card so laid across the stems of the flowers and secured to the bottom of the container, as to ensure that the flowers are held in a reasonably secure position. Where the method of securing is by means of staples the ends thereof shall be either closed or splayed
Polyanthus Primroses Stock, other than long spiked stock Violets	In the case where there is a sufficient quantity of flowers in the container for them to be held in a reasonably secure position by interlocking the stems of the flowers, by such interlocking.

SECOND SCHEDULE

Kind of Flowers	Type of Container	Manner and Extent of Lining and Covering
Carnations	Any container, the interior of which, other than the lid thereof, is wholly coloured white.	The inside bottom of the container is completely lined with paper.
Carnations	Any container, the interior of which, other than the lid thereof, is partially coloured white.	The inside bottom of the container and such parts thereof, other than the lid, as are not coloured white are completely lined with paper.
Carnations Roses Tulips	Any container.	The inside bottom of the container is completely lined with paper and each bunch of flowers is protected by paper or such other material as may from time to time be approved by the Committee, from the top of the blooms down to one half of the length of the bunch.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport)

Section one of this Order provides that containers of flowers for export shall be fitted with either -

- (a) one or more pinned sticks; or
- (b) one or more bridges of such type and material as may be approved by the Committee each bridge being securely fastened to the sides of the container;

so as to enable the flowers to be held in a reasonably secure position. The proviso to that section provides that in the case of flowers of the kinds specified in the First Schedule they may be secured by the methods prescribed in that Schedule for those flowers respectively.

Section two of the Order provides that -

- (a) carnations may be exported in containers which are wholly or partially white inside if only the inside bottom of each container and such parts thereof as are not white, are completely lined with paper, and
- (b) carnations, roses and tulips may be exported in any container if the inside bottom of the container is lined with paper and each bunch from the top of the blooms down to half the length of the bunch is protected by paper or such other material as may from time to time be approved by the Committee.
