THE MEAT (MAXIMUM RETAIL PRICES) (BAILLIWICK OF GUERNSEY)
(NO. 2) (AMENDMENT) ORDER, 1953.

Made 7th January, 1953.

Coming into Operation ... 12th January, 1953.

As Competent Authorities as regards the Bailiwick of Guernsey excluding the Island of Alderney and as regards the Island of Alderney respectively in relation to Regulation 55 of the Defence (General) (Guernsey) Regulations, 1945, we hereby make the following Order:-

1. The Meat (Maximum Retail Prices) (Bailiwick of Guernsey) (No. 2) Order, 1952 (a) shall be amended by substituting for Article 6 thereof the following Article:-

"6. (1) Every person who sells meat by retail shall keep displayed at the place of sale in a conspicuous position and so as to be clearly readable by all customers throughout the whole time during which meat is being offered or exposed for sale a notice stating in plain words and figures the maximum prices of all such meat.

(2) Every person who sells meat by retail shall furnish with each delivery of meat to a customer's premises a ticket indicating in clear and legible words and figures the description and quality of the piece or cut, the weight and the price per lb. and whether the meat is "Locally produced", "Home-killed" or "Imported"."

2. The Interpretation (Guernsey) Law, 1948, applies to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of a Guernsey enactment.

3. This Order may be cited as the Meat (Maximum Retail Prices) (Bailiwick of Guernsey) (No. 2) (Amendment) Order, 1953, and shall come into force on the 12th day of January, 1953.

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport).

This Order requires retailers of meat to furnish with each delivery of meat to a customer's premises a ticket indicating in clear and legible words and figures the description and quality of the piece or cut, the weight and the price per lb. and whether the meat is "Locally produced", "Home-killed" or "Imported".

Similar provisions were previously in force under Ordonnance Provisoire Règlant la Vente de la Viande (1932).
