THE UTILITY APPAREL (MAXIMUM PRICES AND CHARGES) (BAILLIWICK OF GUERNSEY) (AMENDMENT NO. 7) ORDER, 1951.

As Competent Authorities as regards the Bailiwick of Guernsey excluding the Island of Alderney and as regards the Island of Alderney respectively in relation to Regulation 55 of the Defence (General) (Guernsey) Regulations, 1945, we hereby make the following Order:-

1. The Utility Apparel (Maximum Prices and Charges) (Bailiwick of Guernsey) Order, 1951 (a) as amended (b) shall have effect subject to the following amendments:-
 - (a) at the end of Article 4 there shall be added the following:-
 - "(4) For the purposes of this Article, a man's jacket and trousers made up from cloth of the same specification number and supplied as a two-piece suit shall together be deemed to constitute a single garment."; and
 - (b) by substituting in the Third Schedule thereto for the words "Related Schedule No. 4A", the words "Related Schedule No. 4N".
2. The Interpretation (Guernsey) Law, 1948, applies to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of a Guernsey enactment.
3. This Order may be cited as The Utility Apparel (Maximum Prices and Charges) (Bailiwick of Guernsey) (Amendment No. 7) Order, 1951, and shall come into operation on the 3rd day of December, 1951.

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport).

This Order further amends The Utility Apparel (Maximum Prices and Charges) (Bailiwick of Guernsey) Order, 1951, by bringing into force Related Schedule No. 4N which contains overriding maximum prices for women's and maids' underwear and nightwear (other than knitted apparel).

The changes effected by the Related Schedule are indicated in the Explanatory Notes issued therewith.

The Order also provides that the maximum charge for altering a man's jacket and trousers which have been supplied as a two-piece suit shall be computed as if they constituted one garment.
